otherwise we will end up with a world full of rubbish and there will be no more toys.



It's true, they are hidden because they are reluctant to tell anyone what they do. Maybe your school does have a Young Carer awareness programme in which case you are fortunate. Often carers don't want people to know that someone in their family needs care or they are embarrassed to show they care. Getting breakfast and shopping for your mum is uncool right?

Some comments overheard at the Festival

- * It's actually a relief to know that there are a lot of young carers here and that I can talk to them.
- You need to care for other people but you also need to care for yourself.
- The first year I was really terrified because I had never been camping before but now I've got used to it I come back every year anyway.
- What we do isn't just like a job, or something that's just mugged onto us, it's something that we choose to do and we are proud to be carers.
- I like caring for people because I've had a lot of experience of troubles and bullying and I don't like to see people go through that hard time.
- I can make a difference in someone's life. When I first found out I was a young carer it was very isolating, it was scary, you had a label, then coming to a festival like this you realise you're not the only one.
- 🔻 I didn't actually realise I was a young carer so I had to grow up pretty guickly and look after everyone in the family.
- « A lot of them have totally opened up this new personality that we've never seen before because they've never had the chance to be a child like they have here because here you can run around 'till midnight - you can't do that when your parents are around.

- I wish my Gran to feel happy again.
- I wish my mum would be ok for ever and always.
- It lets me begin the childhood I never had.

a different attitude

I was amazed to learn that children as young as 5 years old can be the one person giving care in their families and the number of carers between 10 years and 14 years old exceeds 60,000. Another thing that surprised me is that boys and girls are equally likely to be a young carer. Young carers are often unable to have very much social life outside of school time. In fact many find they have difficulty in mixing with other people and making friends

It is often the case that Young Carers do not do so well at school or have such good career prospects, probably because they have given so much time to looking after a dependant person in their family.

If you are a carer yourself you can certainly feel proud of your choices. Nobody has the right say that passing exams or getting a lucrative career is more important than caring for someone in your family.

Tye's story - caring for his younger brother

Tve has three siblings. His voungest brother has a form of Autism. This means his brother's behaviour can be unpredictable.

They share a bedroom, so if his brother gets up very early, it wakes Tve. He then makes his brother's breakfast and helps him to get ready before doing the same for himself. This makes the whole family late for school at times.

Tye helps to care for his brother to give his parents a break and because his little brother demands it. Tye would like to see his friends more often, but he can't. Most nights he has to go home to help look-after his little brother.

There was a pop song with the words "It's my life, I'll do what I want to do". How that turns out depends on your attitude. When you see someone who needs help with their homework, or maybe needs a

friend or even is getting bullied, or looks tired when they arrive at school late. Don't go with the flow and ignore the situation, switch around and take a different attitude.

Martin Luther King Jr., the great African-American Civil Rights Movement activist spells out this different attitude. He said when talking about the story of a man first question which the priest and the

Levite asked was: 'If I stop to help this man, what will happen to me?' but the good Samaritan reversed the question 'If I do not stop to help this man, what will happen to him?".

I have just read a book by Rod Liddel called **Selfish Whining Monkeys: How We Ended Up Greedy, Narcissistic and Unhappy**. I love that title! He was writing about his generation not yours. They grew up in the sixties and were the ones that fell out of love with Christianity and fell in love with themselves (Narcissism) and it did not work well and they still don't know why. You can be the ones that rediscover the best reasons to be unselfish, kind and forgiving and to take responsibility for what happens to others.
