Peter graduated from Newbold Missionary College in May 1962 and joined Granose Foods Limited, based at that time on Stanborough Park. He was Office Manager and thus commenced forty loyal years of continuous service, in a variety of roles, for the Church that he loved, its membership and above all his ultimate overseer, his Heavenly Father.

Born in Birmingham during the time of the Great Depression, Peter left school at the age of fourteen and secured employment working for a grocery store where he remained until called up to complete his National Service.

Drafted into the Royal Air Force Peter served in the Catering Corps for the duration of his two years' service. Returning to civilian life he secured the post of Store Manager for a George Mason grocery store in Birmingham.

Prompted by the Holy Spirit, Peter began searching for spiritual assurance. Invited to attend an evangelistic campaign held in Birmingham's 'Theatre Royal' led by Pastor Kenneth Lacey, he found Jesus and in Peter's own words was, "born again". On the 21<sup>st</sup> of July 1956 Peter gave his heart to Jesus and was baptised alongside 56 other souls. Having given his life to Jesus Peter was confronted with the reality of finding employment with Sabbath privileges. Leaving his managerial post with George Mason's, Peter found employment with an engineering firm as an 'accounts clerk'.

Peter subsequently joined the Camp Hill Church where he was to meet the young woman who was to become his life-long loving companion, supporter and friend. Jean Barnwell and Peter were married on the 9<sup>th</sup> March, 1958 at Camp Hill Church, a love story that would span over a further sixty-three years and receive the blessing of 3 sons, 6 grandsons and 4 great grandchildren.

In 1960 Peter applied to Newbold College to join the Business Studies course. He graduated May 1962 and joined Granose Foods Limited, based at that time on Stanborough Park. He was Office Manager and thus commenced forty loyal years of continuous service to the denomination in a variety of roles for the Church that he loved, its membership and above all his ultimate overseer, his Heavenly Father.

#### > DEATH OF PASTOR JOHN ARTHUR OBE ON REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

'It is very inspirational to see and read about the marvellous range of activities which are continuing at the Park Church. We have so many happy memories of the 40 years we spent worshipping and fellowshipping in such a wonderful environment.' So wrote Ruth Arthur earlier this year saying how much she and husband John enjoyed receiving this church newsletter.

John had been suffering from poor health for eleven years and was wheelchair bound due to developing septicaemia which led to double pneumonia following a visit to Albania and subsequently a stroke. He slipped away peacefully during the two minutes silence on Remembrance Sunday, surrounded by his family.

John was well-known at Stanborough Park Church and acted as its Communications Leader for a while before moving from Hemel Hempstead to Crieff. During his time in denominational employment in the Watford area he served as BUC Publishing director, Communications & Religious Liberty director, Executive Secretary, Vice President and President, in addition to time as ADRA-UK and ADRA Trans European Division Chief Executive Officer.



It is probably for his time with ADRA that John would want to be remembered most. It was for his work with the charity that led to him being awarded the OBE in 2006. This wasn't his first medal as he had been presented with the 'Order of Mother

Teresa' in 1994 for his humanitarian work which was Albania's highest civilian award.

He was especially concerned with Albania's plight as it was throwing off its Communist yoke and times were particularly hard for its citizens. He was responsible for setting up ADRA warehouses and attending to the welfare needs of that developing country. During this time he struck up a long-term close friendship with the BBC's correspondent, Bill Hamilton, who was also moved by the plight of Albania's citizens and together they worked to ensure that the rest of the world was made aware of it, raising money for aid as they went along visiting schools etc.

Not many people have the privilege of having a school named after them but that happened to him in 2015 following his efforts to refurbish the building. Even after his retirement he continued to raise funds for the country and on seeing the run-down school in Vrap was determined to do something about it raising funds, despite his poor health, to transform it into the modern building it is today. (The accompanying PDF tells more about his work in Albania.)

Despite his poor health, which led to a lengthy stay in hospital last year following a fall, John continued to write articles and correspond with a wide range of friends. His health began to deteriorate earlier this year. He will be sorely missed by many and especially by his wife Ruth and their children Christine and Andrew (whose mother-in-law, Margaret Lowe, has also just died) and their families.

#### ✤ How it all began

Brian Davison's father introduced the Annual Toy Service to the Ealing church and told Pat Walton, who worked for him, about it. Knowing this was the sort of thing her father, Alf Kelly, would be interested in she in turn told him of this interesting way of helping the needy at an especially difficult time of the year. Enthusiastically seizing the idea he held the first Toy Service at Stanborough Park Church in 1961. #### STANBOROUGH PARK'S STORY: In the Beginning\*

#### This is the first of a series of articles about the beginnings and development of Stanborough Park and our church.

It was 1906 and the brethren were concerned. The Adventist message was spreading around the British Isles, new churches and denominational institutions had been established but in order for the work to progress a more co-ordinated approach was necessary.

A mill near Horsham had been purchased in 1899 for the production of health foods but had burnt to the ground the following year and the rented premises in Birmingham were proving to be an unsatisfactory location. A printing press was operating in the Holloway area of North London, not far from the British Union Conference office, but would benefit from more space. The college which was established in 1901 had already operated in three locations by 1906 and was now based at Duncombe Hall, again located in the Holloway area. There was also sanitarium operating near Caterham (with another in Leicester) and a school with 32 pupils in Kettering. To be more effective these institutions needed a more permanent and suitable location.

As is usual practice, a committee was formed to look into providing a suitable location for these institutions to thrive and promote the Lord's work. Taking into account Mrs. White's concern for the people of London to hear the message and her counsel to look for rural locations (she was still alive at this time) the brethren felt that they needed to find somewhere rural, near London, which had good rail connections with the city and so cast their net wide which led them to many locations.

Fortunately for them one property coming onto the market that year met all their criteria – the Stanborough Park estate with its large country house/mansion built some 20-30 years previously along with 75 acres of woodland and pastureland. It was ideally situated in a rural location near Watford which was on the London-Birmingham main line. It stretched from near the current 'Dome Roundabout' to Sheepcot Lane and west to the Kingswood Farm Estate - of which more in a future article.

On visiting they were impressed by its country location, surrounded by trees and with pasture land for grazing, a mansion house which would be suitable premises for the college and ample space to build a food factory and publishing house. Running along its boundary was the Watford-St. Albans road and a railway branch line to Watford Junction was within walking distance. It didn't take long for them to appreciate its merits and a letter from the committee stated,

'We visited the property about ten days ago. Much had been told us of the natural beauty of Stanborough Park and now we can give no higher praise than to say it exceeded even our anticipation..... The acres of wood surround on several sides the cleared portion of the estate, so that a spirit of quietness and restfulness will always pervade the grounds.'

The contract was signed immediately after Christmas that year. Things clearly moved fast in those days when planning permission was not part of the scheme of things and construction of the food factory and publishing house began immediately.

By October both were occupied and functioning with it being remarked that staff working in the publishing house were able to look out of the windows to see a vista of fields and pasture land stretching ahead for many miles unlike the limited view they experienced in their North London premises. The college students moved into the mansion in September, relocating from Duncombe Hall in North London.

Although not completed, everything was sufficiently advanced for a dedication service of Stanborough Park and its institutions to be held on 28<sup>th</sup> October, 1907 when some 200 people crowded into the packing room of the food factory – the largest room available on the estate. During the service an account of the search for a suitable location was given along with an address likening the occasion to the dedication of Solomon's temple and outlining the seven supporting pillars of the Adventist faith.

For some time we had been looking forward to this occasion with much anxiety and many had worked faithfully to get everything in readiness as nearly as possible. But with all the efforts that were put forth, the grounds immediately surrounding the new buildings, were not in such a state of readiness as we had hoped they would be, due to unavoidable deals (delays?). The last few hours many willing hands were employed to arranging the assembly room .... while chairs and improvised seats had been provided. The packing room was crowded to its utmost capacity, and the doors into the shipping room were thrown open, and all its available space was occupied, besides the standing room near the main entrance and on the landing being filled with attentive listeners.

... the material buildings with their equipment, and the beautiful estate with its secluded places under the wide-spreading branches of the stately forest trees, inviting the child of God to communion with his Maker, were solemnly dedicated to God and His service, while a specific blessing of Heaven was sought that every part might be counted as sacred to the work of the Third Angel's Message, and that the soul, body, and spirit of everyone who is called to labour in connection with the work that centres here, in its general management, the education of labourers, the preparation of the printed page, or the manufacture of health foods, might be wholly surrendered to God moment by moment, that His purpose in the establishment of this centre for the Union Conference may be fully accomplished.

Will He not be pleased if we show that we have not forgotten Him? Jesus, the Prince of Life, gave all to bring salvation within our reach. . You that have means, who have been in the habit of making donations to your relatives and friends until you are at a loss to know what to invent that will be new and interesting to them, seek to put your ingenuity to the test, as well as your influence, to see how much means you may gather to advance the work of the Lord. Let your skill and your capacities be employed to make the coming Christmas one of intense interest, paying your addresses to the God of heaven in willing, grateful offerings. Follow no longer the world's customs. Make a break here, and see if this Christmas cannot show thousands of dollars flowing into the treasury, that God's storehouse may not be empty.

We are now nearing the close of another year, and shall we not make these festal days opportunities in which to bring to God our offerings? I cannot say sacrifices, for we shall only be rendering to God that which is His already, and which He has only intrusted to us till He shall call for it. God would be well pleased if on Christmas, each church would have a Christmas tree on which shall be hung offerings, great and small, for these houses of worship.\* Letters of inquiry have come to us asking, Shall we have a Christmas tree? Will it not be like the world? We answer, You can make it like the world if you have a disposition to do so, or you can make it as unlike the world as possible. There is no particular sin in selecting a fragrant evergreen, and placing it in our churches; but the sin lies in the motive which prompts to action, and the use which is made of the gifts placed upon the tree.

The tree may be as tall and its branches as wide as shall best suit the occasion; but let its boughs be laden with the golden and silver fruit of your beneficence, and present this to Him as your Christmas gift. Let your donations be sanctified by prayer, and let the fruit upon this consecrated tree be applied towards removing the debts from our houses of worship at Battle Creek, Michigan, and Oakland, California.

## Britain: Nation Honours Former Humanitarian Leader With Major Award

Seventh-day Adventist Pastor John Arthur recently retired after 45 years of denominational service which included 11 years as executive director of the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), has been given his country's top honour for public service, the Order of the British Empire.

This is not the first national honour Arthur has received. In 1994, Albania's then-President, Dr. Sali Berisha, presented Arthur with the country's highest civilian award, the Order of Mother Teresa, in recognition of his humanitarian services.

Arthur was listed as a recipient of the British award, known as the OBE, in The Queen's Birthday Honours List, which is drawn up by the national government of British Prime Minister Tony Blair. According to the official Web site of the British monarchy, King George V established the Order in 1918. Today it "is the order of chivalry of British democracy. Valuable service is the only criterion for the award, and the Order is now used to reward service in a wide range of useful activities."

Useful activities would certainly describe John Arthur's life. Following a four-year stint as president of the Adventist church in Britain, he headed ADRA in the church's Trans-European region, based in St. Albans, England. During these years he was responsible for coordinating millions of dollars worth of humanitarian aid, dispatching emergency supplies and initiating numerous development projects throughout Europe, the Middle East and Northeast Africa.

Not content to remain behind his desk, Arthur made many visits to countries where ADRA funds were sent. Frequently, he put his own life at risk when, with several willing volunteers from the area, he delivered huge amounts of aid into Albania, Bosnia, Croatia and Serbia, at the height of the civil war in the Balkans.

When the Bosnian capital, Sarajevo, was cut off from the outside world for three years, ADRA was a major player in distributing food, clothing, medicines and hospital supplies to thousands of desperate people. The agency even operated the city's post office during the darkest days of the conflict. Two of its 103 volunteers were killed in action.

Arthur was also active in publicizing and promoting ADRA's work at home. Many local schoolchildren will recall how Arthur, accompanied by BBC Television News Correspondent, Bill Hamilton, visited their schools and asked for help, particularly for the children of Albania. At the

time, the infant mortality rate in this country was more than four times higher than the rest of Europe and some babies were dying, weighing a pound less at six months than when they were born. Moved by the plight of these innocent victims of war several local schools got together and raised enough money to buy life-saving respirator/ventilators for each of the country's maternity hospitals.

Arthur's role with ADRA has also taken him to Afghanistan, Pakistan, Kashmir, and Sudan. It was here he had an amazing escape when local tribesmen wielding submachine guns attacked the vehicle in which he was travelling.

Nominations for the Queen's Birthday Honours are carefully vetted and researched, and those who eventually receive the honours have to come very highly recommended. Although we do not know the full details of how Arthur's nomination was dealt with, a number of high profile individuals spoke on his behalf. Among these were: Sarah, Duchess of York, who is highly involved in charity work; comedy actor Sir Norman Wisdom, who travelled to Albania with John Arthur and formally opened an ADRA warehouse there; Pavli Qesku, the former Albanian Ambassador to the UK; and Adventist Pastor Ralph Watts, ADRA president for 16 years; and leaders of several other aid agencies.

One of Arthur's foremost supporters has been Bill Hamilton, who first met him in connection with a report he was preparing for BBC Television about the deplorable conditions in Albania in the early nineties.

"ADRA was conducting a feasibility study regarding the urgent need for locally-produced food for babies," he recalls, "bearing in mind that Albania had the highest infant-mortality rate in Europe at that time. Subsequently, I saw ADRA deliver countless tons of aid to the most vulnerable in Europe's poorest country. Later I did some additional filming relating to the agency's £20 million (US\$37 million) aid package for the people of Kosovo in 1999. Projects included the renovation of 400 school buildings, the cleaning of 2,000 contaminated water-wells, the vaccination of 40,000 cattle, the installation of wood stoves into hundreds of homes, and the re-establishment of a children's dental service."



Hamilton added, "I have also accompanied John to dozens of schools throughout Britain to increase awareness regarding the needs of the under-privileged and the disenfranchised. What a thrill it was to see children as young as four engaging in all sorts of fund-raising activities to help their unfortunate counterparts. One school in High Wycombe raised no less than £16,000 (approximately US\$30,000) for respirator-ventilators which directly saved many lives."

"I have seen John appealing to a large [European Union] sub-committee in Brussels on behalf of the needy, negotiating with prime ministers regarding cooperation agreements, and liaising with the leaders of other agencies to ensure that the delivery of aid is well coordinated."

On hearing the news about his award Arthur said, "This is the mother of all surprises, and really it is a tribute to the marvellous international team with which I have been privileged to work. Their unflagging and sacrificial efforts in the most desperate circumstances have to be seen to be believed."

Arthur is writing a memoir about his travels to 106 countries around the globe.

#### Fundraising dream completes a new school in Albania

Twenty-five years on from his initial visit to the former totalitarian state of Albania, Pastor John Arthur, a now retired director of the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) both in the UK and later the Trans-European Division, sits comfortably in his wheel-chair, rejoicing that a lifetime dream has been achieved. He is also a little surprised, and maybe embarrassed, that a



newly rebuilt school in a remote mountain village is now called the John Arthur School.

Vrap is a small village some 38km south of the Albanian capital, Tirana. Already retired but still active on behalf of the country, John visited there in 2010 and discovered a run-down building that pupils could only access via a gaping hole in an external wall. He says, "It was just like a scene from the Middle Ages, totally unacceptable for any European country in the 21<sup>st</sup> century!" He determined to raise

funds back in Britain to facilitate a desperately-needed upgrade.

Things were not so straightforward for him as with previous ADRA projects. On his return home, he developed septicaemia and double pneumonia. This led to a severe stroke and then a long and slow path to a partial recovery. But John is not a man to give up easily. Despite being limited to a wheelchair and only able to type with one finger, he has not stopped fund-raising and PLANNING.

With strong family support, and encouragement from former BBC TV reporter, Bill Hamilton, funds were raised and just before Christmas Bill, together with Maureen Kennedy of the Herts. Women's Institute, delivered educational equipment and school uniforms to the totally refurbished school.

Bill and John had first met in Albania where a combined passion to improve the lives of this impoverished nation meant that their combined skills in journalism and fund-raising have led to many successful ADRA projects over the years. As Bill delivered supplies to the school, his mind also went back over the years, noting the change and difference that the many members of the ADRA team have made. Watch his full video report:

Hashmet Biba, the man in charge of the building project, is just one of at least 100 individuals who have been attracted to the Seventh-day Adventist Church as a result of ADRA's humanitarian influence. Many thousands more have had their lives changed for the better.

ADRA's work may have started in Albania 25 years ago. However, the work it does today is still essential in changing lives and providing hope.

#### Retired ADRA Director Restores Rural School in Albania

# John Arthur doesn't let double pneumonia or a severe stroke stop him from fulfilling a lifetime dream.

Twenty-five years after his first visit to Albania, John Arthur sits comfortably in his wheelchair, rejoicing that a lifetime dream has been achieved. He is also a little surprised, and maybe embarrassed, that a newly rebuilt school in a remote mountain village in the former totalitarian state is now called the John Arthur School.

Arthur discovered the run-down school in Vrap, a small village some 25 miles (40 kilometres) south of Albania's capital, Tirana, in 2010, about 15 years after he started visiting the country as director of the Adventist Development and Relief Agency in Britain and later the Trans-European Division, which coordinates the Seventh-day Adventist Church's work in 22 countries, including Albania.

Arthur, already retired when he found the school, was surprised to see students could only enter the building through a gaping hole in an outside wall. "It was just like a scene from the Middle Ages, totally unacceptable for any European country in the 21st century," Arthur said.

He determined to enlist ADRA's assistance to raise funds back in Britain to facilitate a desperately needed upgrade. But his hopes did not materialize as simply as with previous ADRA projects. On his return home, Arthur developed septicaemia and double pneumonia. This led to a severe stroke and then a long and slow path to a partial recovery. Arthur, however, was not a man to give up easily. Despite being limited to a wheelchair and only able to type with one finger, he pressed ahead with fundraising and planning.



The funds were finally raised with strong family support and encouragement from a former BBC television reporter, Bill Hamilton. Incidentally, Arthur first met Hamilton in Albania, and their mutual passion to improve lives in the impoverished country meant that their combined skills in journalism and fundraising resulted in many successful ADRA projects over the years. In late December, Hamilton delivered educational equipment and school uniforms to the totally refurbished school.

Thousands of Albanian lives have been changed though ADRA's humanitarian work, including Hashmet Biba, the man who oversaw the refurbishment of the Vrap school.

ADRA supports numerous programs in Albania. The organization runs a full health program from its local headquarters in Tirana. It also works with Roma families, educates people on human trafficking, and assists national education authorities in reducing violence and bullying in schools. Over the Christmas holidays, ADRA workers distributed Christmas parcels to Roma children and others in need in cooperation with ADRA's offices in Austria, Germany, and the Netherlands.

While ADRA entered Albania 25 years ago, its work continues to change lives and provide hope through the efforts of people like Arthur. Just ask the children at the John Arthur School.
