### **\* VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL:**

An average of 36 children aged 7 – 12 years attended the Vacation Bible School held in The Stanborough Centre 8 - 12 August, led by Paula Carrillo. It was organised by the Children's Sabbath School Department, supported by Pathfinders, Toddler group, Messy church and Prayer Ministries along with many other church members. This time it was intended to cater for members' children as with the small number of volunteers the numbers were restricted to a maximum of 40. Advertising was restricted to the children's Sabbath Schools although the children were encouraged to invite a non-SDA friend to join them. Whilst some volunteers were



available for the whole week others could only give one day or a few hours. However, organiser Paula Carrillo says that if she ran a future event, which her volunteers (see photo, left) are keen to do, it would be advertised in local Children's Centres and schools.

The VBS was based in 'Jasper Canyon where every child is treasured'. 'There was a very welcoming and exciting

atmosphere every day and we all had a great time!' Paula reports, continuing, 'The children 'dug' during the week (to see) how important they are to God. Every day had a daily 'Find', which was reinforced through the different five 'stations': the Excavation Site would help them 'dig' in prayer, the Artifact Station was where they would make a creative artefact as a reminder of the finding of the day, the Bible Gem station was where they would find the story of the day, the Testing Pit was the sport station and the snack station would see them literally dig into their snacks.



The children were led in groups by members of the Earliteen Sabbath School whilst the adult volunteers organised the 'stations'. 'It was evident that God brought together this team and everybody's talent was used in a timely and providential way. Others worked tirelessly a week before in the preparations like the Renard family who were in charge of the scenography,' Paula asserts.



Summing up she said, 'Every child enjoyed the week and expressed their disappointment on Friday when we had to conclude the week. A child said to her parents "I am so sad that VBS finished. I enjoyed the week and was looking forward to every day". Another child said to his mum — "I thought it would be so boring, but I actually enjoyed it. It was very good!" The children enjoyed learning more about the Bible and God in an interactive way. They all decided to invite Jesus in their lives and 26 of them would like to take

further Bible studies; the Pastoral Team is now busy planning for this.

view of her third pregnancy! but **Deputy Ophelia** Herman filled in and led the team with Kashina Smith, the Club Secretary.) This



being an SEC event the Pathfinders came from all across the south of England from Cornwall to Milton Keynes,

along with a visiting group from Scotland and one from the north of England.



Paula Carrillo reports that a group of 60 Adventurers and their parents attended the Adventurer camp whilst 22 Pathfinders and eight leaders attended



the Pathfinder camp. 'Both camps had the theme 'God's World, Our World' where the emphasis was to look after the environment. The week was packed with practical activities

and honours about nature,' she explained. Paula added that 'The SPC and Watford Town

Pathfinder Clubs joined efforts to bring a Puppet Show to Hemel Hempstead on Saturday afternoon which was well attended by families who passed by. At the end of the camps the Adventurers reached a Silver Award Category and the Pathfinders achieved a Gold Club Category!'

Summing up the event she concluded, 'This was the first in-person Camporee at SEC level after the two years of the pandemic. Consequently, both clubs were



under new leadership. They all did a wonderful job, got to know each other better and enjoyed working together keeping the children working as a team.

'The meditations were very inspirational and practical and six of our Pathfinders expressed the desire to be baptised and Bible studies will be organised for them. Many thanks to all the parents from both clubs who joined the camping and cooked for the clubs which kept them going!'



#### CHURCH MATTERS 1: NEWS IN BRIEF

- The funeral of the late Ron Hansen-Luke, who died after a long illness, took place on Friday, 12<sup>th</sup> August in Melchbourne, Beds. Our condolences to wife Sunny.
- The funeral of Ron Grant was held at Ruislip Crematorium on 24<sup>th</sup> August. Ron's last attendance at church was the July Communion Service. Our condolences to Ron's children Jeremy and Katie, who wrote and read the eulogy (see page 6).
- 'The Bussue family convey our thanks to all who visited, called, sent cards and messages of condolence following the death of our father Neville Thomas Bussue on 6.8.22. Dad spent 98 fulfilled years on this earth and now waits along with mum for the resurrection'. Originally from the Caribbean, Bernell adds, the Bussue family settled in Sheffield where he grew up. His parents moved to live with him in Bricket Wood almost four years ago. Bernell adds that his father died exactly one year and one week after his wife and his funeral was held in Sheffield on 12<sup>th</sup> September, 2022.
- **Dr. Harry Leonard** died on 9th August after a short illness. He was a teacher at Stanborough School for about a decade after his arrival in the mid 1950's and he and his family were members of this church. He went on to lecture in History at Newbold College becoming Chair of the Humanities Department and also an author. Past student, Brian Davison recalls, "I always remember being in a lecture given by Harry Leonard when at Newbold. *He defined a committee as 'a group of individuals who alone had no power to do anything but collectively decide that nothing can be done at all!!!"* His funeral took place at the Newbold Church on Thursday, 1<sup>st</sup> September. We send our deepest sympathy to his wife Christine, daughters Stephanie and Julia, and son Peter.
- We are sad to announce that former SPC member Muriel Glendenning died 13<sup>th</sup> September and also that Basil Powell died peacefully on 12<sup>th</sup> September. Basil and wife, Gerda, were regular worshippers until deteriorating health prevented attendance in person. Prior to his retirement Basil worked in the BUC Treasury Department. Our condolences to wife Gerda, son Colin and granddaughter Katie.
- Car broken into in church car park during August: The Church Site Management Team reports that during one Sabbath in August a car left in the church car park was broken into. Items were stolen including credit cards which were then used to make purchases locally before the card was blocked. The incident has been reported to the police. Members are reminded that all vehicles are parked entirely at the owner's risk. Stanborough Park Church and The Stanborough Centre cannot accept liability for damage, theft or other untoward events happening on the premises. The Committee also reports some criminal damage which occurred a few weeks ago when a window was broken in the Oak Room after a missile was thrown at it from outside of the building and adds, 'We ask that everyone using the church and centre facilities respect the sanctity of the place. Naomi summed up the course in the following words, 'It's a year-long programme involving workshops, a spiritual gifts assessment, required readings, session planning and delivery, collaboration with other leaders, group discussions, etc - culminating in a 20,000 word portfolio and having to defend this to a panel of SEC ministers/staff.'

### **❖ A DAUGHTER'S EULOGY FOR RON GRANT (abridged)**

Ron's daughter, Katy, wrote and read the eulogy at his funeral sharing her fond memories of the man she knew and loved. This is an abridged version.

Not how did he die, but how did he live?
Not what did he gain, but what did he give?
These are the units to measure the worth
Of a man as a man, regardless of birth.
Not, what was his church, nor what was his creed?
But had he befriended those really in need?
Was he ever ready, with word of good cheer,
To bring back a smile, to banish a tear?
Not what did the sketch in the newspaper say,
But how many were sorry when he passed away.

Ron Grant died unexpectedly not long after attending the July Communion Service. His funeral took place at Ruislip Crematorium on 24th August and was conducted by Pastor Terry.

Although he was not a 'high profile' member he had many friends in the church who attended his funeral. He also had two children and three grandchildren: Jeremy, the father of Aidan and Callen, and Katie, the mother of Tristan, the youngest aged three.

Katie began the eulogy with the above poem by Merritt Malloy which has become a very popular item at funerals and based her words very much on the sentiment it expresses, giving us a picture of the man he was to his friends and family.

She gave very little information about how and where he spent his life other than he regarded himself as 'Anglo-Indian' with a mother from Goa and a blond Scotsman for a father; also that he was a successful salesman. Ron's wife died many years ago.

Having shared those words with the assembled audience she continued, 'On first read, I instantly found this poem well suited to my father. It reflects the many heartfelt messages and condolences I've received expressing sorrow and recounting in great detail my dad's endearing qualities, along with many fond memories of him and my mother together. From his always hospitable nature and true passion for the classical guitar, to his personable manner, his wit and his silliness - the messages revealed precisely how my dad would be missed.

'And so to the poem's opening line of "what did he give?" As explained, my dad was different things to a range of different people. However, there were common reasons why. My father was generous with his time, his attention and focus on others. He recognised and responded to those in need with friendship, guidance, and support.

He was engaging and able to connect with all different types. Indeed, he was genuinely interested in people's lives, their personalities, their successes, their potential. As (was) once said to me, "Ronald has a knack for making you believe in yourself!" He was, after all, a successful salesman and, if needs be, he could sell you... to you! And, with his grandchildren, he was beyond entertaining as well as sacrificing and quite selfless - and they adored him for it.

'The poem also mentions befriending those in need. Now, my dad's curious nature, sincere interest in others and his personal enjoyment of hosting meant he befriended many new people over the years. Started by my mother decades back, when it was not unusual to have someone we'd never met sit down to lunch with us at Christmas, Easter or, for that matter, any weekend day. Often an elderly or simply lonely new church member - although I do distinctly remember the time my dad brought home for dinner a hitchhiking student couple from France whom my mum duly insisted should stay with us for the week to facilitate their sightseeing in London!

'My dad continued the hospitality theme throughout his life, frequently inviting many new faces from his church as well as old friends to his home.'

Summing up she concluded, 'My dad was

one of a kind, and although he will be terribly missed, there is comfort in knowing that he lived life to the fullest, and had such



a positive impact on those he knew and loved.'

### **COMBINED YOUTH EVENT IN THE PARK: text and photos submitted by Tunde Adebayo**





#### **NOTES FROM THE CHURCH BOARD:**

- The Treasurer reports that the HSBC loan has been retired with only the SEC loan outstanding. It is anticipated paying back the loans in 2024.

### **❖ THE HISTORY OF STANBOROUGH PARK CHURCH CONTINUED: the BBC broadcast**

'History was made on 26 January. The announcement said, "9:30 Morning Service from the Stanborough Park Seventh-day Adventist Church, Watford." It continued with details of the hymns to be sung and



concluded, "Preacher Pastor Roy Burgess." So began an article written by the Stanborough Park Communications Team (probably Frank Blewitt and Bronwen Atkinson) appearing in the Messenger dated 28th February, 1986.

It continued, 'The broadcast that Sunday morning on Radio 4 was the first ever of an Adventist Sabbath morning service on national radio.'

Obviously it wasn't a live broadcast; it had been recorded on Sabbath morning, 18<sup>th</sup> January, when

the technical and production people from BBC Radio 4 parked their outside broadcast truck in the car park. Under instructions from the Rev. Stephen Oliver, who was responsible for Religious Broadcasting, the team of sound engineers and a secretary set about organising the church with microphones being distributed at various significant locations around the sanctuary.

The editor recalls the church being quite full that day and instructions were given to the congregation as to how to behave during a radio recording! Thankfully the service was able to proceed with few interruptions. After the benediction the congregation, holding its collective breath, hovered above the pews reluctant to sit down and create undue noise so were relieved to see the Reverend Oliver appearing on the platform inviting everyone to be seated. Checking the tape followed and it was only the last section that needed to be re-recorded and was duly done. There is no record of the programme but Pastor Burgess preached on the topic of 'Your King is coming' whilst the editor recalls 'Crown Him With Many Crowns' being one of the hymns and Paul Bellamy recalls 'Lo! He Comes With Clouds Descending' as another.

So how did this come about? It was thanks to Michael and Vivienne Harrison who were recent converts

to the church. Michael worked for the BBC whilst Vivienne worked for many years at Stanborough Secondary School. Michael's close contacts with the broadcaster enabled him to get the BBC end set up with Pastor John Arthur, then the BUC Communications Leader, acting as liaison between the denomination and the BBC. Sadly Michael left the church not many years later but his time as a member clearly had a Divine purpose!

Although it occurred many years ago there are still members of the present congregation who were present but, strangely, for many of them the occasion has been lost in the mists of time! The photos were taken by Geoff Coombs who can't



recall it either! The editor remembers the event clearly as does Dave Burgess who was able to locate a letter from the BBC to his father arranging a preliminary visit. Another person who remembers it well is Paul Bellamy who took part in the service as the elder on duty. Sadly, the senior elder involved, Dr. Terry Gallivan, passed away many years ago. However, Paul has kindly written an account of the day. Another person who remembers the occasion is Audrey Balderstone who correctly recalled that the children's story teller was a young Audrey Boyle Andersson - and she is fairly sure that the story was about a donkey!

On the next page can be found the Messenger entry of the event. Many thanks to David Bell at the Press for locating this and producing the copy - as you can see it was spread across two pages. Also many thanks to Paul Bellamy who kindly – and promptly - recorded his memories of the event for S\*Park News.

### Paul Bellamy remembers:


A normal Sabbath morning, a regular Divine Service, not quite. Additional microphones were in evidence and a box with a red light on it was visible on the pulpit, not to mention the additional sound recordists.

The platform party had been briefed well before hand: Pastor Roy Burgess, Doctor Terry Gallivan (Senior Elder) and Paul Bellamy (Elder). 'As soon as the red light illuminates recording is in progress. If you make a mistake or stumble over a word go back and repeat it, the mistake will simply be edited out. Speak clearly into the microphone and just continue as normal, as if the BBC personnel and all their paraphernalia, just simply isn't there!'

The service that followed ran in accordance with the Church's usual order of service and while all the hymns chosen cannot be recalled all carried the theme of the second advent including 'Lo! He Comes With Clouds Descending'; of the others one thing is certain, Pastor Burgess chose rousing favourites to rally the voices of the congregation in praise.

The Scripture reading was read by Paul Bellamy and Doctor Terry Gallivan lead the Church in prayer.

When Pastor Burgess stood up to preach, recognising that the service would be broadcast early on a Sunday morning, he began by referencing that many listening would no doubt be eating their breakfast cereal, probably manufactured by Kellogg's. Thus making a connection to the early history of the SDA church in the USA. He went on to describe certain fundamentals of our faith most particularly the second coming of Jesus.

# PARK CHURCH ON BEE

History was made on 26 January. The announcement said: '9.30 Morning Service from the Seventh-day Adventist Church, Stanborough Park, Watford.' It continued with details of the hymns to be sung, and concluded 'Preacher Pastor Roy Burgess'.

The broadcast that Sunday morning on Radio 4 was the first ever of an Adventist Sabbath morning service on British national radio. Alerted by MESSENGER, no doubt you listened to it. Of course it was not live. It was recorded a few days earlier on Sabbath 18 January.

That morning there were a few new faces at the Park. They were Revd Stephen Oliver, BBC producer for religious broadcasting, and his team of secretary and sound engineers. Mr. Oliver told the congregation that they were there for an act of worship to be shared with countless others; not only with those in hospital and the housebound, but also those getting up, having breakfast or perhaps washing the car.

Pastor Burgess preached on the subject 'Your King is Coming'. He was assisted by church elders Dr. Terence Gallivan and Paul Bellamy, and by Audrey Boyle who told the children's story. Three ladies, Irene Golding, Pauline Potter and Raelene Stanley-Ware sang together beautifully. Others who contributed to the music were Brian and Romola Combridge and Peggy Mason.

Church member Michael Harrison who works for the BBC helped with the programme preparation. Pastor John Arthur, in his role of BUC Communication director, arranged for the broadcast to be made.

There has been much favourable reaction. Pastor Burgess has received dozens of letters, many of them asking for more information about our Church. He is sending them copies of *Focus on the Adventist Way*.

#### THE END OF AN ERA:

The hoarding for Ouest France's leading story said it all, summing it up succinctly in a language not known for its brevity; translated it read, 'Queen Elizabeth II: the death of an icon.'

Very few members will remember any other monarch. For 70 years she dedicated herself to a 'life of service' to her country and what is now the Commonwealth. She kept true to her faith and saw us through many challenging times.

"I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, will be devoted to your service." Pastor Terry delivered a sermon with a Jubilee-related theme on 4<sup>th</sup> June. Referring to the statement the Queen made from South Africa upon hearing of her accession to the throne (left) he dealt with the issue of what was meant by a 'life of service'. In the Queen's case he said it meant 'dedication to her role in an ever-

changing world' as demonstrated by her charity work, diplomacy and decorum.

Christians too, he explained, also need to live a life of service. True service is indiscriminate in its ministry – because of need - it builds communities; not serving others is detrimental to our own welfare. Like batteries, which with misuse become worthless, we gain strength and power through being useful to others. However, not all service is obvious, much is done behind the scenes but, nevertheless, is essential for the smooth-running of so much that is part of everyday life.

"We are created for service", he maintained. "God can use anybody if we desire to live a life of service for Him.... He will use us in a powerful way to reach many people." He stressed that He will use the weak - even flawed Biblical characters, of which there were many!

"I offer you a life in service. A life of dedication, a life filled with God and His ways. That's the way to live, so that when we depart from this earth our life ... would have been a good one ... and have been a legacy to be proud of. May God help us to live a life of service."

One Vision held a Remembrance Service for HM Queen Elizabeth II in the Peace Garden on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> September.
