sun came out and so did the crowds! It was thrilling to see queues for the children's activities, visitors from the community and everyone taking advantage of being able to sit in groups on chairs or on the grass. The live music was appreciated and the stall holders were kept busy. Volunteers helped clear up and a number of families stayed to enjoy the last of the sunshine. We felt truly blessed

to have shared the day with church and community members.'

Unlike the event commemorating the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee there were stalls, entertainment, live music and children's activities on offer. The inflatable slide proved particularly popular; there was a never-ending queue of children standing quietly with their parents patiently waiting their turn. Next to that were tables with coronation-themed crafting activities to keep the children entertained. Football also proved popular but with the big goals out of use this time small children were seen enjoying a good kick-about with equally small portable goals instead.

There was a good selection of stalls selling craft items and Pat's clothing and bric-a-brac stalls

proved particularly popular, raising a total of £623 for

the Soup Run. The Adventist Discovery Centre and ADRA-UK also had a stall and another was offering free copies of The Ministry of Healing and The Great Controversy.

Food stalls proved to the one run by the Stanborough Secondary School PTA which also sold bears and



coronation-themed tee-shirts. It raised £900 of which £600 was profit although one parent donated £250 which gave them a head start! The horsebox was back again, too, selling drinks and snacks.

Live accordion music featured on the stage and later when Pastor Geert arrived for a jamming session with two guitarists and a keyboard player things certainly livened up with his singing and his improvised drumming on his stool! During a very spirited rendition



of 'By the Waters of Babylon' a group of women of all ages was spotted dancing and thoroughly enjoying themselves! He finished his performance with a

few patriotic songs and finally the National Anthem which was accompanied by much flag-waving.

FROM THE ARCHIVES:

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TILL HIS BRAINS DRY OUT (ABRIDGED)

This article was discovered in the Messenger archives some time ago and in view of the baby dedications it seems an appropriate time to share it! Written nearly 100 years ago the author recalls an 'old wives' tale whilst promoting a new 'health book'!

WHEN my wife and I were young parents we went to live in a community that still retained many of the beliefs and practices of our forefathers, some of which were very admirable and others rather awesome.

One day my wife went visiting with the baby and called on a group of mothers who, naturally, were interested in the infant, having had some of their own. After a while one of them asked, "But don't you keep a hood on your baby's head?" "Oh, no," said my wife, "not in such warm weather as this. When it's cold, of course, I put a hood on her if I take her out-of-doors." "Oh, but that's not the reason," they said. "We always keep a

hood on a baby till he is six months old. It takes that long for his brains to dry out."

Now, I suppose that you who read this will smile a little at that age-honoured custom of drying out a baby's brains. But I wonder if you don't know somebody in your neighbourhood who is peddling some false science to young mothers about how to treat their babies, and insisting that she knows better than they, because she had a dozen babies before they were born.

But just for the sake of the ignorant in your community, you must acquaint yourself with the full, true science in the new book, 'All About the Baby', by Dr. Belle Wood....... It is the second textbook in the Parents' Training Course conducted by the Home Commission.

All thinking persons will welcome the instruction offered in this book; and if there is any one who thinks he does not need it, all I have to say is that I think there really is some sense, if we know where to apply it, in those mountaineer women's practice of keeping a bonnet on the head of a person "till his brains dry out."

The men featured in dark suits in the centre of the photo are Barney Goulstone (left), Granose Foods Manager and George Anniss (right), Manager of 'The San' who was possibly the bandmaster. Mr. Goulstone was a recent convert from the Salvation Army so was probably the inspiration behind the formation of the band. It is uncertain when it was formed and when it was (sorry!) disbanded! Interestingly, there seems to have been no objections raised to the large drum on the left being played in church!

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HEALTH CORNER: The Invisible Wound -**How Past Traumas Shape Our Ability to** Trust

Jane's heart raced as she saw the text message. It was from Tom, her husband. And he was running late for dinner, again. Memories of her father's late-night arrivals and angry outbursts quickly resurfaced.

Jane's trust in others had always been shaky but she never understood why. Jane's mind raced with suspicion and doubt as she wondered if Tom's reason for being late was genuine or if there was something more sinister at play. In a knee-jerk reaction, Jane confronted Tom accusing him of not caring about her feelings or their relationship. Tom, shocked by the intensity of Jane's response, became defensive and hurt. The conversation spiralled into a heated argument, further widening the gap between them.

But these trust issues did not stop with Tom. As time went on, Jane's trust issues intensified. She began to alienate her friends and family, constantly guestioning their motives and doubting their sincerity.

Naturally this led to cutting everyone off slowly meaning life became isolated and lonely, unable to escape the cycle of suspicion, confrontation, and deteriorating relationships. With every passing day Jane's world grew darker and lonelier as the invisible wound caused by her past traumas slowly consumed her ability to trust and connect with others.

Why am I telling you Jane's story?

Well, Jane's story serves as a powerful example of how past traumas can shape our ability to trust, impacting not just our interpersonal relationships but tionships: Past trauma can distort your also our relationship with God. This is an issue that is especially relevant to us as Christians as our faith teaches us about the importance of trust and love in our

We might sometimes ask, "How could a loving God allow such hurtful experiences to occur?" But the reality is that we live in a fallen world and sometimes pain and trauma are part of our journey. Yet God never abandons us in our suffering. Remember, "He heals the broken hearted and binds up their wounds" (Psalms 147:3).

However, it's essential to recognise that unresolved trauma, even when hidden or seemingly forgotten, can have a profound unconscious influence on our relationships and life choices. If we don't address this trauma it can trap us in a cycle of mistrust, misunderstanding, isolation, and pain.

Think of unresolved traumas as hidden boulders beneath the placid surface of a serene lake. The lake may seem inviting but, as we dive deeper, we encounter these remnants of past upheavals. These hidden traumas can catch us off guard, causing unexpected pain and confusion. So, what signs should you look change the way you deal with your trigout for?

Here are a few examples:

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1. Unresolved anger: Carrying unresolved anger or resentment from past experiences can create barriers to trusting others as these emotions can cloud

your judgment and willingness to form new connections.

- 2. Difficulty recognizing healthy relaperception of what a healthy relationship looks like, making it hard to trust in those relationships that are genuinely safe and supportive.
- 3. Fear of being hurt again: If you've experienced pain and heartache in past relationships you might fear going through similar experiences again making it hard to trust and open yourself up to new connections.
- 4. Difficulty expressing emotions: Struggling with expressing your emotions can hinder trust-building as open communication and emotional sharing are essential for developing strong connections with others.
- 5. Difficulty trusting your own judgement: Past traumas can lead to selfdoubt and questioning your ability to make sound decisions making it difficult to trust yourself and, subsequently, oth-
- 6. Projecting your feelings of mistrust onto God: Dealing with unresolved trust issues can make it difficult for us to fully surrender our lives to God, which can adversely affect our spiritual growth.

These are just a few examples. Next we'll delve into an ancient approach to overcoming trust issues rooted in past trauma. We'll explore strategies that can gers, helping you rebuild trust in yourself, others and, most importantly, God. Are you curious about what these strategies are and how they can impact your life?
