SPRINGTIME HOUSE-TO-HOUSE COLLECTION RAISES £17,400 LOCALLY FOR ADRA

Church members were busy collecting for ADRA last Easter and raised a total of £17,400 in the local area. The Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) was established in November 1956 by the Seventh-day Adventist Church to provide humanitarian relief and welfare. By the mid-1970s, the organization began to broaden its mission from disaster relief into programmes leading to long-term development. Currently one of the leading non-governmental relief organisations in the world, the agency was granted General Consultative Status by the United Nations in 1997, giving it added voice in the international community.

Today there are more than 4,000 ADRA staff working in 125 countries. **David Balderstone**, proprietor of Garston Gardens and Volunteer Transport Manager for ADRA-UK (based in 'The Lodge' on Stanborough Park), describes the organisation's current projects.

ADRA-UK has had an unprecedented number of requests for Emergency Funds after severe flooding in many parts of the world in the past few months. Help has been given to those affected by the Peru Earthquake and to those affected by floods in Southeast Asia, Eastern China and Sudan. Medical aid, food, shelter and other goods, and financial aid, has been sent to these areas. Parts of the UK have been affected by flooding too and as well as practical help ADRA-UK has contributed to funds set up to help those whose homes have been destroyed. As a result ADRA-UK's Emergency Funds are depleted and any contributions would be gratefully received. (See address at the bottom of the shoe box appeal.)

- Boxes can be delivered to ADRA-UK, The Lodge, Stanborough Park, Watford WD25 9JZ Monday-Thursday 9-5 and Friday 9-noon. They need to be received by 10th November so that they can be packed into a container and sent by sea to arrive in time for Christmas.

NEWS FROM THE ADVENTURER AND PATHFINDER CLUBS

The Adventurer and Pathfinder Clubs (the denomination's version of Scouts and Guides) held an Investiture earlier this summer. 32 Adventurers (with 9 more receiving awards/reading certificates) and 19 Pathfinders (with 7 more receiving honours/attendance certificates) were invested and a total of 255 Honours Awards were received by Adventures and 70 by Pathfinders.

Most of the children live in the local area with some from slightly

farther afield who attend Stanborough School. Earlier this year they undertook a 10 mile sponsored walk along the canal towpath from Cassiobury Park to Kings Langley raising a total of £1462.80 for the HEART (Harmonising & Empowering Africa to Regenerate Together) Charity.

The money will be used to build a walkway and stairs to allow blind or disabled children in a village in the Democratic Republic of the Congo to move safely between their village and school in good or bad weather. The charity was introduced to the children by Pathfinder Leader, Angelette Muller, and a cheque for £1500 was given to HEART representative Farozia Chinegadoo during the service.

At 10am, every other Sunday, the Stanborough Centre is filled with bouncy, lively children from 5-15, ready to play, learn and do activities. The children split into their age groups for the next five hours where they learn things from camping skills to marching; cooking & health issues to etiquette. As in the scouts/guides, badges are awarded in leisure, arts & crafts, nature, health, science and more in the yearly investiture services when children have the opportunity to show their family and friends what they have achieved.

If you go outside, in good weather, you will find games such as duckduck-goose, dodgeball, football and skipping being played. (In bad weather, games are played inside.) Sometimes the leaders take the children out onto Stanborough Park to enjoy the football pitch and running track there. Christmas and summer parties are held too when the children have an input on what they do - such as bowling or adventure parks.

At 12pm, parents arrive, having had a relaxing Sunday morning, to collect their children who have enjoyed a fun-packed morning with their friends for only 50p!
